### About the survey

Government budget decisions – what taxes to levy, what services to provide, and how much debt to take on – have important consequences for all people in society. When governments provide information and meaningful channels for the public to engage in these decisions, we can better ensure public money is spent on public interests.

**The Open Budget Survey (OBS)** is the world's only independent, comparative and fact-based research instrument that uses internationally accepted criteria to assess public access to central government budget information; formal opportunities for the public to participate in the national budget process; and the role of budget oversight institutions, such as legislatures and national audit offices, in the budget process.

The survey helps local civil society assess and confer with their government on the reporting and use of public funds. This 8th edition of the OBS covers 120 countries.





### **Transparency**

This part of the OBS measures public access to information on how the central government raises and spends public resources. It assesses the **online** availability, timeliness, and comprehensiveness of eight key budget documents using 109 equally weighted indicators and scores each country on a scale of 0 to 100. A transparency score of 61 or above indicates a country is likely publishing enough material to support informed public debate on the budget.

Senegal has a transparency score of 40 (out of 100).


#### Transparency in Senegal compared to others








# How has the transparency score for Senegal changed over time?

Senegal's transparency score of **40** in the OBS 2021 is moderately lower than its score in 2019.

#### What changed in OBS 2021?

Senegal has increased the availability of budget information by:



Publishing the Citizens Budget online.

However, Senegal has decreased the availability of budget information by:

• Failing to produce the Year-End Report and Audit Report.

#### Recommendations

Senegal should prioritize the following actions to improve budget transparency:

- Produce and publish the Mid-Year Review and Audit Report online in a timely manner.
- Include in the Executive's Budget Proposal data on the financial position of the government and data on fiscal risks, such as expenditure arrears and contingent liabilities.
- Improve the comprehensiveness of the Citizens Budget.
- Publish the Year-End Report in a timely manner.



## **Public Participation**

The OBS assesses the formal opportunities offered to the public for meaningful participation in the different stages of the budget process. It examines the practices of the central government's executive, the legislature, and the supreme audit institution (SAI) using 18 equally weighted indicators, aligned with the Global Initiative for Fiscal Transparency's <u>Principles of Public Participation in Fiscal Policies</u>, and scores each country on a scale from 0 to 100.

Senegal has a public participation score of 4 (out of 100).

## Extent of opportunities for public participation in the budget process



#### Recommendations

Senegal's Ministry of Finance and Budget has established policy consultations during budget implementation but, to further strengthen public participation in the budget process, should also prioritize the following actions:

- Pilot mechanisms to engage the public during budget formulation.
- Expand mechanisms during budget implementation to engage any civil society organization or member of the public who wishes to participate.
- Actively engage with vulnerable and underrepresented communities, directly or through civil society organizations representing them.

Senegal's National Assembly should prioritize the following actions:

- Allow members of the public or civil society organizations to testify during its hearings on the budget proposal prior to its approval.
- Allow members of the public or civil society organizations to testify during its hearings on the Audit Report.

Senegal's Court of Accounts should prioritize the following actions to improve public participation in the budget process:


• Establish formal mechanisms for the public to assist in developing its audit program and to contribute to relevant audit investigations.



### **Budget Oversight**

The OBS examines the role that legislatures and supreme audit institutions (SAIs) play in the budget process and the extent to which they provide oversight; each country is scored on a scale from 0 to 100 based on 18 equally weighted indicators. In addition, the survey collects supplementary information on independent fiscal institutions (see Box).

The legislature and supreme audit institution in Senegal, together, provide weak oversight during the budget process, with a composite oversight score of **30** (out of 100). Taken individually, the extent of each institution's oversight is shown below:



#### Recommendations

Senegal's National Assembly provides limited oversight during the planning stage of the budget cycle and no oversight during the implementation stage. To improve oversight, the following actions should be prioritized:

- Legislative committees should examine the Executive's Budget Proposal and publish reports with their analysis online.
- A legislative committee should examine in-year budget implementation and publish reports with their findings online.



- In practice, ensure the legislature is consulted before the executive shifts funds specified in the Enacted Budget between administrative units; spends any unanticipated revenue; or reduces spending due to revenue shortfalls during the budget year.
- A legislative committee should examine the Audit Report and publish a report with their findings online.

To strengthen independence and improve audit oversight by the Senegal Court of Accounts, the following actions are recommended:

- Require legislative or judicial approval to appoint and remove the head of the supreme audit institution.
- Ensure audit processes are reviewed by an independent agency.

## The emerging practice of establishing independent fiscal institutions

Senegal does not have an independent fiscal institution (IFI). IFIs are increasingly recognized as valuable independent and nonpartisan information providers to the Executive and/or Parliament during the budget process.

\*These indicators are \*not\* scored in the Open Budget Survey.



## Methodology

- Only documents published and events, activities, or developments that took place through 31 December 2020 were assessed in the OBS 2021.
- The survey is based on a questionnaire completed in each country by an independent budget expert:

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 To further strengthen the research, each country's draft questionnaire is also reviewed by an anonymous independent expert, and in Senegal by a representative of the Ministry of Finance and Budget.
